AREA PROFILES

This project was previously called the Regional and Rural Edition (RRE) to emphasize its focus on regional and rural recreation needs and priorities. This project name was used during the data collection, and community engagement and outreach phases which occurred primarily in 2021. As this report was being completed in 2022, DPR decided to rename the project the Parks Needs Assessment Plus (PNA+) to clarify and better communicate that this project complements and offers new information not previously included in the 2016 Parks Needs Assessment (PNA), such as mapping and analyses related to population vulnerability, environmental benefits, environmental burdens, and priority areas for environmental conservation, environmental restoration, regional recreation, and rural recreation. (Please note that there remains some text and graphic references to the RRE in this document because that was the project name when some components of this study were completed.)

STUDY AREA DESCRIPTION

PHYSICAL CONTEXT

The Lake Los Angeles/Pearblossom/Llano/Valyermo Study Area is located in the Antelope Valley Regional Study Area. The Lake Los Angeles/Pearblossom/Llano/Valyermo Study Area is bordered by the Antelope Valley to the north and west, San Bernardino County to the east, and the Angeles National Forest to the south. The Study Area encompasses approximately 273 square miles. The unincorporated communities of Lake Los Angeles (partially), Pearblossom, Llano, Valyermo, and Crystallaire are located in the Study Area.

STUDY AREA CONSIDERATIONS

The Study Area has major constraints, including natural hazards, such as earthquakes, extreme heat, and wildfire, lack of infrastructure, including public transit service, and limited water supply. The desirability of rural living and the availability of affordable housing have led to significant growth in some unincorporated communities, including Lake Los Angeles, the largest community in the Study Area. Poverty levels in the Study Area are high; in 2016, 49 percent of the population had an income below 200 percent poverty level (the County average in 2016 was 40 percent). Some residents commute long distances to access employment opportunities and specialized recreational facilities in Lancaster, Palmdale, and the Los Angeles Basin.


KEY ANALYSIS TAKEAWAYS

- » Environmental vulnerability, social barriers, and transportation barriers are the most prevalent dimensions of population vulnerability in the Study Area.
 - » Only 10% of residents live within walking distance of a rural recreation site.
 - » No rural recreation sites in the Study Area are served by public transit.
- » The majority of rural recreation site area in the Study Area falls under Nature-Based Recreation Area. The Study Area contains relatively little Local Park and Regional Recreational Park area.
- » Only some Study Area residents live within a 5-mile drive of trails and pathways (21%) and experiential learning opportunities (20.6%).
- » All three indicators of rural recreation priority (high population vulnerability, low proximity to rural recreation sites and proximity to the fewest recreation opportunity types) are pronounced in the Study Area.

KEY COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TAKEAWAYS

- » Heat, safety, distance, time, limited information about parks and facilities and cost are identified barriers to park use for residents who live in the Study Area.
- » Residents say they need more swimming and recreation facilities, more trails, spaces for gathering and events, equestrian facilities, accessible spaces to exercise and programs for seniors.
- » Greatest needs are for places to swim, play and attend fitness classes; spaces for events and cultural activities; and places to be surrounded by nature.
- » Two-thirds of survey respondents say they are recreating outside less often due to COVID, and 79% are looking for recreation activities closer to home because of the pandemic.















Walking Distance (0.5 miles from entry)















COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT THEMES

BARRIERS RESIDENTS EXPERIENCE TO USING PARKS AND FACILITIES



EXTREME WEATHER

Hot summers and cold winters in the Antelope Valley make outdoor recreation activities difficult many months of the year.



LACK OF SHADE

Without shade, many parks are unusable during hot months.



LIMITED ACCESS TO WATER

There is a lack of water facilities and features like fountains, swimming pools and splash pads to keep residents cool and hydrated in hot months.



LACK OF TRANSIT

Public transit wait and travel times to parks can be up to two hours or more and there are few options for carpooling or shuttles.



DISTANCE

Many residents and families have to travel long distances to parks and facilities since they are not available nearby.



SAFETY

Concern about unhoused people in the park, as well as pandemic safety precautions like social distancing and mask wearing in parks.



TIME

Many residents do not have time, due to work or other reasons, to travel to and/or use regional parks and facilities.



LACK OF INFORMATION

Residents do not know where parks are located, what facilities are available, or how to use and get to parks.



COST

Fees to use some parks and facilities or rent equipment is too expensive for low income families.



LIMITED ADA ACCESSIBILITY

Parks and other facilities are not accessible to disabled and older residents.



NOT ENOUGH MAINTENANCE AT PARKS AND FACILITIES

Park facilities and trails need repairs, maintenance and restoration.



LACK OF CONNECTIVITY

Not enough trail networks or safe biking and pedestrian options.



LACK OF FACILITIES AND PROGRAMMING

Nearby parks lack swimming facilities, sports areas, and gathering spaces, and provide few activities for residents to participate in.



LACK OF OUTDOOR RECREATION AREAS

Including trails for hikers and equestrians, pet-friendly areas and affordable water-based recreation.



LACK OF NEARBY GREEN SPACE

Many residents live in park-poor communities and cannot access parks or green spaces near to where they live.

“Too hot, too cold, too windy to do much outside in the Antelope Valley.”

“Areas to hike by yourself aren’t safe near me.”

“No swimming pool nearby”

“There is no reach out program toward seniors in my community.”

“There are NO spaces for taking kids on a field trip that is within our bus range without taking a full day trip, and buses are expensive!”

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT THEMES

COMMUNITY SUGGESTIONS TO INCREASE AND IMPROVE VISITS TO RURAL PARKS AND FACILITIES



ACCESS TO WATER

Additional water facilities and features like swimming pools and splash pads to keep residents cool in hot months, and restoration of local lakes and other waterways for recreation and to support area wildlife.



MORE SHADE

Shaded seating, play areas and walking trails, and more trees between and around parks.



TRANSIT OPTIONS

Provide free and more frequent transit to nearby parks.



ENHANCED SAFETY MEASURES

Provide more patrols on trails and at parks. Ensure visitors are adhering to social distancing and other protective measures during the pandemic.



BETTER ACCESS TO INFORMATION

More information about events at parks and available amenities.



MORE CULTURAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Open up park spaces for the community to hold more events and cultural activities.



EXPANDED RECREATION FACILITIES

Extend facilities hours, provide more outdoor equipment and indoor recreation spaces, and build additional parks, jogging tracks, courts and swimming facilities to meet demand.



IMPROVED MAINTENANCE AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Clean and upgraded restrooms, playgrounds and trails, more wildfire mitigation and removal of dead vegetation. More places to sit, gather with friends and family, and walk dogs.



BETTER ACCESS TO PROGRAMS

Provide affordable equipment and classes for all ages, especially youth, seniors and residents with disabilities and/or health limitations.



MORE FACILITIES FOR EQUESTRIAN USE

Parking for horse trailers at equestrian staging areas and trailheads, and places to hold equestrian events.



DEDICATED USE TRAILS

Provide separate trails for hiking, biking, equestrian use to help mitigate conflict and increase safety for all users along trails.



ENHANCE CONNECTIVITY

Provide greenways and trail networks that connect parks and provide safe transportation corridors for bicyclists, equestrians and pedestrians.



EXPAND GREEN SPACE

More parks, trees, native habitat gardens, and natural open spaces.



PARTNERSHIPS WITH COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

Expand park use and green space access through school and community partnerships.

“Most people need free transportation and designated bus that takes people to parks.”

“Swimming lessons should be free and encouraged in our youth. Swimming Programs and teams should be free for all people. The price for gear and membership to be in sport leagues can be too much for many community members. There should be free leagues and equipment at every park for the use of the community.”


“More community rooms, too, in the established parks. The more community gathers, the more they will use the open spaces of the park.”





Areas With Access to the Fewest Recreation Opportunity Types






