

APPENDIX B RURAL STUDY AREA PROFILES

This project was previously called the Regional and Rural Edition (RRE) to emphasize its focus on regional and rural recreation needs and priorities. This project name was used during the data collection, and community engagement and outreach phases which occurred primarily in 2021. As this report was being completed in 2022, DPR decided to rename the project the Parks Needs Assessment Plus (PNA+) to clarify and better communicate that this project complements and offers new information not previously included in the 2016 Parks Needs Assessment (PNA), such as mapping and analyses related to population vulnerability, environmental benefits, environmental burdens, and priority areas for environmental conservation, environmental restoration, regional recreation, and rural recreation. (Please note that there remains some text and graphic references to the RRE in this document because that was the project name when some components of this study were completed.)

STUDY AREA DESCRIPTION

PHYSICAL CONTEXT

The Leona Valley/Lake Hughes/Elizabeth Lake Study Area is located in the Antelope Valley Regional Study Area. The Leona Valley/Lake Hughes/Elizabeth Lake Study Area is bordered by the Antelope Valley to the north and east and the Angeles National Forest to the south and west. The Study Area encompasses approximately 60 square miles. The unincorporated communities of Lake Hughes, Leona Valley, and Elizabeth Lake are in the Study Area.

STUDY AREA CONSIDERATIONS

The Study Area has constraints, including natural hazards, such as earthquakes and wildfire, limited infrastructure, including public transit service, and limited water supply. It should be noted that the proximity of the San Andreas Fault to the Study Area and the increasing likelihood of catastrophic wildfires into the future has a significant impact on development in the Study Area. While the desirability of rural living and the availability of affordable housing have led to recent population growth in unincorporated communities in the County, the Study Area's population has declined since 2010. Many residents commute long distances because employment opportunities in the Study Area are limited.

KEY ANALYSIS TAKEAWAYS


- » Environmental vulnerability is the most prevalent dimension of population vulnerability in the Study Area.
- » Only 10% of residents live within walking distance of a rural recreation site.
- » No rural recreation sites in the Study Area are served by public transit.
- » The majority of rural recreation site area in the Study Area falls under Nature-Based Recreation Area. The Study Area contains no Local Park or Regional Recreational Park area.
- » Study Area residents live within proximity to very few types of recreation opportunities.
 - A very small proportion of Study Area residents live within a 5-mile drive of gathering spaces (0.2%), sports facilities (1.4%), water-based recreation opportunities (1.2%), general recreation facilities (2.6%), health and fitness facilities (2.6%), and support facilities (1.6%).
- » The Study Area has access to few recreation opportunity types.

KEY COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TAKEAWAYS

- Safety, time, distance, lack of information about facilities and cost are identified barriers to park use for residents who live in the Study Area.
- » Residents say they need more outdoor and water recreation facilities, more green spaces and natural areas, expanded and maintained hiking and equestrian trails, and facilities for horses.

- » Nearly one-third of survey respondents from the study area (29%) say they are recreating outside less often, and one-quarter (24%) say they are recreating outside more often due to the pandemic. 93% are looking for more recreation activities closer to home because of COVID.



COMPOSITE POPULATION VULNERABILITY







Walking Distance (0.5 miles from entry)




OF STUDY AREA RESIDENTS LIVE WITHIN WALKING DISTANCE **OF A RURAL RECREATION SITE**

Cycling Distance (2.5 miles from entry)




OF STUDY AREA RESIDENTS LIVE WITHIN CYCLING DISTANCE **OF A RURAL RECREATION SITE**

Driving Distance (5 miles from entry)





















Proximity to Sites With Trails and Pathways











COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT THEMES

BARRIERS RESIDENTS EXPERIENCE TO USING PARKS AND FACILITIES



SAFETY CONCERNS

Residents don't feel safe at parks. Safer trails for hikers and horse riders are needed.



TIME

Many residents do not have time, due to work or other reasons, to travel to and/or use parks and facilities.



DISTANCE

Many residents and families have to travel long distances to parks and facilities.



COST

Fees to enter and/or park at some parks and facilities or rent equipment is often too expensive.



LACK OF INFORMATION

Residents do not know where parks are located, what facilities are available, or how to use and get to amenities.



NOT ENOUGH MAINTENANCE AT PARKS AND FACILITIES

Park facilities and trails need repairs, maintenance and restoration.



LACK OF NEARBY GREEN SPACE

Many residents do not have access to parks or green spaces near to where they live.



LACK OF FACILITIES AND PROGRAMMING

Nearby parks lack tennis courts and swimming pools, and spaces for walking/jogging paths.



LACK OF CONNECTIVITY

Not enough trail networks or safe biking and pedestrian options.

"We really don't have anything classified as a "park" close to home."

"Lack of parking for horse trailers; lack of safe designated trails."

"Our local trails are not maintained and offroad bikes and motorcycles have ruined them by causing ruts in the trail.... The trail heads are obscured by thick brush and berms."



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT THEMES

COMMUNITY SUGGESTIONS TO INCREASE AND IMPROVE VISITS TO RURAL PARKS AND FACILITIES



MORE SHADE

Shaded seating, play areas and walking trails, and more trees between and around parks.



MORE FACILITIES FOR EQUESTRIAN USE

Parking for horse trailers at equestrian staging areas and trailheads, and places to hold equestrian events.



ACCESS TO WATER

Additional water facilities and features like swimming pools and access to waterways for activities like fishing.



MORE TRAILS FOR EQUESTRIAN AND PEDESTRIAN USE

Additional trails for horse riding, and walking trails.



BETTER ACCESS TO INFORMATION

More information about events at parks and available amenities.



DEDICATED USE TRAILS

Provide separate trails for hiking, biking, equestrian use to help mitigate conflict and increase safety for all users along trails.



IMPROVED MAINTENANCE AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Clean and maintain restrooms and trails and provide more wildfire mitigation and removal of dead vegetation.



ENHANCE CONNECTIVITY

Provide greenways and trail networks that connect communities, parks and trails and provide safe transportation corridors for bicyclists, equestrians and pedestrians.



MORE RECREATION FACILITIES

Extend facilities hours, provide more tennis and racquetball courts, swimming facilities, walking and jogging tracks, and open gathering spaces.



EXPAND GREEN SPACE

More trees, native habitat gardens, and natural open space.

"More trees, more community gardens."

"[We need] places where nature is supported."

"Preserve our extensive trail system [and] our easements to trails. Designate our trails for hiking and horses only. Preserve our trails for the future for horseback trail riding."

"Walking/jogging paths within my community."




RURAL RECREATION PRIORITY ANALYSIS

Areas Experiencing the Highest Levels of Overall Population Vulnerability






Areas With Access to the Fewest Recreation Opportunity Types






